Bradley is the first British critic of Shakespeare of the 20th century. His seminal work Shakespearean Tragedy is regarded as a classical piece of criticism on the bard. Although at first this work was considered reputable and was reprinted multiple times, his approach became flawed in the eyes of the scholars of the early 1920s.

As a Shakespearean tragedy represents a conflict which terminates in a catastrophe, any such [41] tragedy may roughly be divided into three parts. The first of these sets forth or expounds the situation, [17] or state of affairs, out of which the conflict arises; and it may, therefore, be called the Exposition.

A. C. Bradley saw Shakespearean tragedy characterized by the "tragic flaw," the internal imperfection in the hero that brings him down. His downfall becomes his own doing, and he is no longer, as in classical tragedy, the helpless victim of fate.
