Bede makes use of and adds to the excerpts from Augustine's writings compiled by Eugippius, a neopolitan who in the seventh century collected meaningful passages from Augustine's commentary on the Letters of Paul for his monks. Bede then arranged these excerpts in the order of Paul's letters as we have them today.

Bede, The Venerable (673-735) English scholar who wrote a history of the early centuries of Anglo-Saxon England and an encyclopedia which consisted largely of excerpts from Pliny the Elder . He noted that the equinox had slipped three days earlier than the traditional March 21, but the calendar remained the same until the institution of the Gregorian calendar in 1582 by Christoph Clavius .

1. From the Bede, Ecclesiastical History of the English Nation (c. 731) Bede [the Venerable], the most learned writer of the Anglo-Saxon period, was born in Northumbria around 673. At the age of seven he entered the twin monastery of Wearmouth- Jarrow and remained there, except for a few short excursions, until his death.

Bede the Venerable, one of the greatest Christian writers of the early Middle Ages, here reflects on the Magnificat. This is the Latin title for the Canticle of the Blessed Virgin Mary proclaimed during her visitation of her cousin Elizabeth. It is sung every night in the Church's evening prayer, part of the divine office or liturgy of the hours. And Mary said: My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior.
